Lowman Post #109 to host NCR District 4 Four Chaplains Service on February 4


On Sunday, February 2, 2025, Dewey Lowman Post #109, 1610 Old Sulphur Spring Rd, 21227 (map) will host the Northern Central Region District 4 Four Chaplains Ceremony at 10 am. Refreshments will be served afterwards.

On February 3, 1943, the SS *Dorchester*, an Army transport ship, was steaming ahead in the icy waters of Newfoundland on a voyage from New York to an American base in Greenland. Sailing the waters of the North Atlantic was extremely dangerous as German U-boats preyed on American ships.

A part of a three-ship convoy, the *Dorchester* had 902 military and civilian personnel on board including four army chaplains—George L. Fox, Methodist; Alexander D. Goode, Jewish; John P. Washington, Roman Catholic; and Clark V. Poling, Dutch Reformed, all first lieutenants.



Early in the morning at 12:55 am, the *Dorchester* was torpedoed by a German submarine. Men jumped into the ocean and were swept away. Overcrowded lifeboats capsized, and men drowned. Aboard ship, panic and chaos ensued, and through it all, the four army chaplains provided calming



voices through prayer, hymn, and encouragement.

When the ship ran out of life jackets, each of the chaplains removed their lifejackets and gave them to others. As the ship sank, the four chaplains were seen still on board with their arms linked and still offering prayer and singing hymns. Acts of valor and sacrifice as theirs can never be forgotten, for they truly earned the name "Immortal Chaplains."

Black Coast Guardsman also sacrificed self to save lives

The transport convoy of the illfated *Dorchester* was accompanied by three Coast Guard cutters, which immediately went into action when the ship was torpedoed. Charles Walter David, Jr., who joined the Coast Guard in 1941 shortly before the war and was assigned to the USCGC *Comanche*.

Aboard the *Commanche*, David performed menial labor, but on that night as part of the rescue effort, David



jumped into the frigid North Atlantic waters to personally save two of his crewmates and assist his crewmates in saving 93 of the 230 survivors from the

Dorchester. He contracted pneumonia from his efforts in the water and died less than two months later from his illness.

The Coast Guard posthumously awarded David the Navy and Marine Corps Medal. In 2010, the Coast Guard named a Sentinel-class cutter the USCGC *David* in his honor. David made the ultimate sacrifice to save others, and his bravery and valor are indeed immortal.



Post #19 hosts African Attire/Dashiki Night for Black History Month

On Tuesday, February 25, Federal Post #19 will celebrate Black History Month with an African Attire/Dashiki Night at 7 pm at the Post. Everyone is asked to wear traditional African attire that acknowledges our heritage.

This year's theme for Black History Month is "African Americans and Labor." From slavery through freedom, work and working continue to play profound roles in helping to



shape the varieties within African American culture and life.

For instance, as we approach our 95th Anniversary, members have asked why are we named "Federal." The short answer is that our history says that we were found during the Great Depression in 1930 by federal employees.

While our Post history does not state it, a black veteran in 1930 who was a federal employee was very likely a postal employee. By 1930, African Americans comprised nearly 24 percent of the postal workforce in Baltimore. While considered low paid workers in larger American society, within black communities, they were part of the black middle-class with steady, dependable work that helped sustain black communities during the Depression.

As members of National Alliance of Postal Employees (NAPE), an industrial union organized by black workers in 1913 to combat growing racial discrimination and segregation in federal employment, many of these black postal workers became politically active leaders within their communities. NAACP national labor director, 1951-77, Herbert Hill noted that when he went to various cities

looking for volunteers for the civil rights struggle, "there would be the minister, the undertaker, the lawyer and the post office worker." A hearty salute to the black veterans who were and are a part of the postal workforce that helped sustain and progress our communities and Federal Post #19.

A posthumous salute to Comrade Dorothy Carter, Post Everlasting, who was a member of the 6888 WAC Postal



Battalion that served in Europe during World War II and a founding editor of *The Scoop*. She was most proud of



being chosen, marching into Paris that she helped liberate, and serving her nation. *The Scoop* recommends the new Netflix movie <u>The Six Triple Eight</u> for a sample of her experiences.

Boys State to be held June 20-26 at McDaniel College; applications now available

This year's MD Boys State will be held on June 15-21, 2025, at McDaniel College in Westminster, MD. Founded in 1935, Boys State is a summer leadership and citizenship

program for high school juniors, which focuses on exploring the mechanics

of American government and politics.

include Activities legislative sessions, court proceedings, law enforcement presentations, assemblies, chorus and bands, recreational programs. High school juniors are selected by local American Legion posts to attend the program. In most cases, expenses associated with attending the program are paid by a sponsoring American Legion post, a local business, or another communitybased organization.

In a tradition that dates to the 1940's, Federal Post #19 attempts to sponsor at least one youth to Boys State. For instance, in 1951, Post #19 sent one of only four African American youths of 150 total in attendance to the Boys State program at St. John's College in Annapolis. The July 7, 1951 Baltimore Afro-American noted that the youths were "chosen by their high schools on the basis of leadership and general character." Apple TV is currently showing the critically acclaimed drama Boys State that follows the trials and tribulations of Boys State attendees in Texas.

Applications for this year's MD Boys State are currently online. To be eligible you must be a male high school junior with at least one semester remaining in your senior year. So, if you know of anyone in our extended Post 19 family who will be in the 12th grade next year, let us know and we'll sponsor him. Apply at the Boys/Girls State Application Portal.

Unit #19 celebrates 90 years of service to veterans and community

Federal Unit #19 was chartered by the Department of Maryland on May 19, 1935, beginning a legacy of service. The first President was Winnie Smith, and since then, twenty-eight women have served as President of Unit #19. Throughout the years, the members of Unit #19 established and supported programs that continue to benefit our veterans and community.

Always a partner with the Comrades of Post #19 and Squadron #19, in the late 1980's, Unit #19 President Molly Alderman along with Post #19 Commander Raymond Gough, and SAL Squadron #19 Commander Jesse Curtis gathered the Post #19 family to burn our mortgage, which was completely paid off after years of perseverance.

Among their many endeavors, members of Unit # 19 collect and distribute blankets and winter gear for the homeless and Christmas baskets for those in need. They organize a Backto-School Block Party that distributes more than 150 book bags with school supplies to neighborhood youth, and their members volunteer at MCVETs, the VA Hospital, and Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen that feeds homeless veterans. They collect puzzle and word game books for hospitalized veterans to help them occupy the many hours away from home.

They also serve our responders giving them small gifts of kindness and care from candy on Valentines Day to coffee and donuts on Patriots (9/11) Day. And of course, they take care of one another, especially those who for whatever reason can't get around like they used to. They serve as Department and District officers and on many of the Department and District committees. They help raise money for Girls State and serve as advisers for the week away at Girls State. In a word, the members of Federal Unit #19 are AWESOME! And The Scoop gives them the heartiest of salutes!
